Zephaniah 2:3;3:12-13 Psalm 146 1 Corinthians 1:26-31 Matthew 5:1-12a

Preferential Option for the Poor Part of Stewardship

The prophet Zephaniah, speaking for the Lord, addresses the people of Israel. They had been in troubled times since they failed to observe the call of God. They had become overconfident in themselves and neglected to see God was the driving force of any good fortune that had come to them. They were haughty as any of their former oppressors.

After their exile there would be a humble remnant that would serve and not be served. "They shall do no wrong and speak no lies; nor shall there be found in their mouths As a community of faith, let us always be alert and aware a deceitful tongue; they shall pasture and couch their flocks with none to disturb them." Is it possible this may happen? Can humanity live in such harmony?

Let it be put this way. This is the call of God. Everyone must choose to respond to the call. Each person has responsibility. Saint Paul drives home this call of God and how and who God chooses.

God chooses the foolish, the lowly and those who count for nothing. Paul gives the reason for this. God uses such people to inform and put into place those who either do not recognize His call or who decide not to heed it. It is to "reduce to nothing those who are something, so that no human being might boast before God." It is due to God, not our own volition, that humankind is blessed in any way.

Over the centuries God's Church has come to better discern and understand God's call.

We have discerned God has a preferential option for the poor. It is an enlightenment most expounded in the 20th century and into this one. It is the social justice teaching of the Church.

This "preference" has always been a concern for God. However, it is Pope Leo XIII who first formalizes the call in official teaching. Pope Leo XIII writes of this in his encyclical Rerum Novarum. In the letter he says capital must serve labor. Providing work is the function of an economy, for labor gives dignity to humankind. Labor takes precedence over capital and technology along with a just wage and the rights of workers. Economic justice is the key to contemporary social questions.

In 1968 Father Pedro Arrupe, who was the superior of the Jesuits coined the phrase, "preferential option for the poor". This concept that is a thread throughout the

Scriptures and Tradition of Christianity is based in Biblical texts such as Matthew 25.

Saint John Paul II (1991) in Centesimus Annos connected spiritual poverty with material poverty. Pope Benedict XVI said preference for the poor is an obligation of Christians. It includes all the marginalized of society. This includes widows, children, people with disabilities, victims of oppression and more.

There are plenty of reasons for suffering in the world. We see it and we experience it. It does make us uncomfortable. None of us likes seeing another person be down and/or in distress. The sight awakens us all too well we are the next one who may suffer the same way. Even a very wealthy person may lose all he or she has. Or, as my running buddy Abe always points out, "you can have lots of money but no good health. So, what good is the money?"

of each other's needs. Many people here are so aware and do work for justice. Let us pray God will always make available whatever is needed by us to serve others. Let the words we read in the prophet be true for us, "...they shall pasture and couch their flocks with none to disturb them."

Let us keep our preference for the poor.
