Baptisim for Infants and Preschool Children under 7 years old At Baptism, infants and preschool children are initiated into the Christian community and begin a life-long journey as a committed disciple of Christ. Be Firm And Affirmed In the Faith

The pandemic humankind has experienced these past few years makes clear the great fear disease causes. It was not an epic story from long ago. It was real in our own time. It has changed the world in that people will never forget it in this lifetime and it will be found in history books.

Bodily disease has always been associated with the forces of death. Death is the greatest evil to be experienced by everyone. Likewise, cures for diseases represent the forces of life. Such is the case in the scripture readings today.

Humankind protects itself by isolating people who are afflicted. When one is cured the officials acknowledge the cure. At that time, the person is welcomed to come out of isolation and rejoin the community. This reintegration is celebrated. Today's psalm, 32, reflects this. It says, "Blessed is he whose fault is taken away, whose sin is covered."

It is divine prerogative to cure people. And note, in the scriptures physical cures come through the forgiveness of sin. Forgiveness is also a divine prerogative. We see this in the Gospel story (Mk 1) today.

Jesus cures the man's leprosy. In the process the man acknowledges Jesus has the power to cure. "If you wish, you can make me clean." Then Jesus uses his prerogative, "I do will it. Be made clean." He tells the man to go show himself to the priests which is a part of the Jewish religious structure. He used religious structures to integrate people who have been isolated from the whole body.

Jesus uses his power to cure disease as a sign of forgiveness. Forgiveness is the prerogative of the divine. It is the way a person is made whole and reintegrated into the community.

Jesus exercises his prerogative to heal and forgive and demonstrates he is divine. It is God's wish to forgive anyone who desires it and is willing to be integrated into the community. The power of Jesus' word and touch causes the cure of the man with leprosy.

Jesus fulfills the religious law. Jesus works through the structure of the law to work the miracle. Jesus made

the man whole. The law is not meant to isolate but to provide a path for integration.

The lesson here is that the Law should be used to draw all together. It should provide a path to inclusion and community. Those who join the community must likewise follow the Law to include other people besides themselves. People who experience inclusion are expected to reach out to others who also seek wholeness in the context of the believing and holy community.

In the second reading, Saint Paul makes the case for effective ethical leadership. First, it must be acknowledged that every human act must reflect the Grace of God. This is true for the smallest of acts as it is for the greatest. As the scripture states, "Whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do everything for the glory of God." Make all the mundane sacred.

Following what St. Paul writes, no one should give offense. By offense, Paul is not speaking of hurting one's feelings. Paul means do not perform acts that impede someone's acceptance of the Gospel.

All people, especially those who are leaders, should bring about the good of the many. All should reach out in a manner that creates a pathway that includes everyone who seeks wholeness in the community. All are welcome to hear the Word of God and be saved.

Working to build a cohesive faith community is labor intensive. Society should devise and implement means for people to become a part of the whole. The aim is to integrate people and not marginalize them.

It brings me great pleasure to see many in this Faith Community of Blessed Sacrament Parish bring others to Church on Sundays. By doing so, you show your confidence in this community of Faith. You are confident the person you bring will have a good experience among the other members.

Please continue to be firm in your faith. Have courage to reach out to other people and bring them to the Lord. Doing so is a sign you and this whole community are firm and affirmed in the Faith.
