Baptisim for Infants and Preschool Children under 7 years old

At Baptism, infants and preschool children are initiated into the Christian community and begin a life-long journey as a committed disciple of Christ. Since the child cannot make this commitment on their own, the parent who requests Baptism states that they wish to pass on the faith in which they believe and live. Parents wishing to have their infant or preschooler Baptized are required to attend Baptism Preparation. This gives them the opportunity to reflect on the meaning of Baptism and to have their questions answered concerning the Sacrament of Baptism and the ceremony. In order to begin preparing for their child's Baptism, parents are asked to contact the parish office at 954-564-1010 prior to the anti- cipated birth or adoption process. Genesis 22:1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18 Psalm 116 Romans 8: 31b-34 Mark 9: 2-10

A Story of Mercy.
We Will Share In His Death.

"I know now how devoted you are to God, since you did not withhold from me your own beloved Son."

These are the words spoken by God to Abraham. Abraham could not have understood what God was up to when God asked him to take the life of his own son. Abraham simply and profoundly trusted in God. On the other hand perhaps God knew that this would be Abraham's response. That is, God knew Abraham would trust and obey. In the end God really did not intend the boy to die. After all, God is a God of mercy.

The Gospel for today (Mark 9) is a story about mercy. Jesus shows Peter His glory before Peter denies Jesus. This episode is meant to give encouragement in the future when all would seem to be lost. It reveals God's kingdom and makes clear Jesus' central role in the kingdom. He is king. The event is for the disciples' benefit and by extension, the reader's benefit.

One might look at Jesus' pending passion and death as a failure. But it was not. It did not mean He lost God's favor. He did not fail His mission. In the beginning of Mark's gospel, God endorsed Jesus' ministry. Now, at the transfiguration God endorses His death. Also, there is something else to consider.

In the beginning of the Gospel when Jesus is endorsed by God at His baptism, no one else heard the voice but Jesus. At the transfiguration others did. The reason for this is because others will share in His death. Another thing to notice is Peter's reaction.

Peter still did not understand Jesus' role. In the transfiguration, Jesus is central to the episode. Jesus IS God. The other two, Moses and Elijah, are not. Peter asked for three tents to be erected. This would give equal status to each person. If Peter truly understood who Jesus is, he would have suggested only one tent be erected over Jesus.

God the Father tells those present, "Listen to Him." By extension he is telling us, the readers, to listen. One must be obedient to what Jesus says no matter the cost. God offers consolation in this life and eternal salvation in the next life. What does this mean to you now?

Who do you say Jesus is? How does He touch your life today? Do you permit the Lord's grace to help you overcome fear? By His passion, death and resurrection Jesus shows He is for us. We need not fear ultimate death. As Saint Paul says, "If God if for us, who can be against us?"

Ultimately, as we share in His death we will share in His resurrection.

THE PROUD HERITAGE OF BLACK SAINTS AND MARTYRS IN THE CHURCH

Christianity is much a story that develops out of the Fertile Crescent and out of Africa. Here are but a couple of heroes of our faith who are black. Space here does not give room for the volumes it would take to name them all.



Saints Perpetua and Felicity both died around the year 202/203 as martyrs at Carthage in North Africa. They were holding each other's hand. Perpetua was the daughter of a pagan nobleman and had an infant child at the time. Perpetua was 22 years old. Felicity was a slave who gave birth while in prison. Three other catechumens were imprisoned with them. All were baptized while in prison before they died in the amphitheater.

Saint Peter Claver was a Spanish Jesuit missionary priest. He was born in Catalonia. He was not of African descent but became the patron saint of slaves due to his devotion and care of enslaved people. During his 40 years of ministry in Colombia he personally baptized around 300,000 people. He is also the patron saint for seafarers. He is considered a heroic example of the Christian practice of love and the exercise of human rights.
